"Shelve any preconceived ideas you may have of what a home should contain," Sara writes. "Instead try to enjoy the process and the challenge of creating a living space that balances practicality with style regardless of how tiny it might be."



4 Tips for a Compact and **Functional Home**

As a stylist with years of experience, Sara has seen her fair share of diminutive interiors. Here are her tips for maximizing yours.

- UNDERSTAND: It's important that you understand how your small space works as a whole. Your building structure and location, for instance, can have an effect on your interior. While some of these factors can be modified, others, "while unchangeable, can be used in a positive way to enhance the overall sense of space." Start by identifying your home's unique attributes and work from there.
- PLAN: Will you be working from home? Do you plan on entertaining a lot? Consider how you want to inhabit your space so it can be used most effectively.
- **DESIGN**: Think about how you can design your space to get the most out of every square inch. Be creative, but keep it practical.
- STYLE: Choose a decorative style that reflects your personality but also works within the space. For example, some colors and patterns can give the illusion of space, while others can make your home appear even smaller.

Stow It Away

These storage solutions translate to an enormous amount of extra space in even the smallest of interiors.

- ON THE SHELF. Whether built-in or added-on, standard cut or made-to-measure, custom-built or DIY, shelving units are the ultimate space-savers and can accommodate just about everything.
- TAKE UP SPACE. Squeeze storage into every last nook and cranny. "Cleverly designed storage units can be custombuilt to any size or configuration," Sara advises.
- THINK INSIDE-THE-BOX. Baskets, boxes and containers work wonders in keeping a home organized and tidy. Stow them away on shelves, inside cabinets or under furniture.
- PRIVATE SCREENING. Some fabric suspended from a shower rod is great for hiding clutter.
- TWO-IN-ONE. Wherever you can, opt for furniture that also doubles as storage (or vice versa), like a desk with built-in filing drawers or a bench with storage inside.
- FOLD IT UP. Furniture that can be stacked, folded or collapsed will space when not in use.
- GET THE HOOK-UP. Don't forget the power of hooks. They're versatile, don't take up much space and are more decorative than other storage options.



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
